Todd Heine, class of 2005

After a semester studying in Salzburg, Austria and earning a law degree from the University of Vermont, immigration lawyer Todd Heine launched his legal software product VentureVisa specifically for talented immigrant entrepreneurs seeking O-1 visas. Heine shuttles back and forth between Seattle and San Francisco's Silicon Valley, where all his clients are tech entrepreneurs for companies like Facebook, Tesla, and WhatsApp.

"In large part, I credit my nearfull-ride scholarships and summa cum laude finish at Vermont Law to the academic discipline I developed as a German major at Longwood

The German program also showed me the value of international studies, and I am the only US-trained lawyer I know to have spent three out of six semesters of law school abroad, at McGill In Montréal and at the Université de Cergy-Pontoise in France. In those three years, I managed to earn degrees in EU and French business and tax law, in addition to a JD. It just wouldn't have happened without my background at Longwood."
